

The Five P's of Taking a Sexual History Partners, Prevention of Pregnancy, Protection from STIs, Practices, Past History of STIs

Counseling skills, characterized by respect, compassion, and a non-judgmental attitude towards all patients, are essential to obtaining a thorough sexual history. This also helps to effectively deliver prevention messages to patients. Key techniques include using open-ended questions, understandable language and normalizing language as shown below:

The 5 P's	Open-ended Questions to Ask
Partners	 "Do you have sex with □ men, □ women, or □ both" "In the past 2 months, how many partners have you had sex with?" "In the past 12 months, how many partners have you had sex with?"
Prevention of Pregnancy	 "Are you or your partner trying to get pregnant" □ Yes □ No "If no, what are you doing to prevent pregnancy?"
Protection from STIs	"What do you do to protect yourself from STIs (sexually transmitted infections) or HIV?"
Practices	"To understand your STI risk, I need to understand the kind of sex you had recently." • "Have you had vaginal sex?" □ Yes □ No • "If yes, do you use condoms?" □ never □ sometimes □ always • "Have you had anal sex?" □ Yes □ No • "If yes, do you use condoms?" □ never □ sometimes □ always • For condom answers, if never, "Why don't you use condoms?" □ • "If sometimes, in what situations/with whom, do you not use condoms?" • "Have you had oral sex?" □ Yes □ No
